"My Identity is in Christ, not in my sin, my past, my mistakes or bad decisions. Not in myself, not in what people say that I am. Not in what I think of myself. My identity is in who Christ says I am. I am enough because HE is ENOUGH." ~Unknown

Thank you for joining me in the journey as we are transformed by His Word, I'm praying for you – I know life is busy, it's hard to find time for ourselves, not to mention to love and serve others. This project was my way to commit to both during this season of my life with 5 kids under 10 running around.

I love how Timothy Keller describes our identity as if we are in the courtroom in his book "The Freedom of Self-Forgetfulness". I highly recommend this short book that talks about our identity.

"Every single day, we are on trial. That is the way that everyone's identity works. In the courtroom, you have the prosecution and the defense. And everything we do is providing evidence for the prosecution or evidence for the defense. Some days we feel we are winning the trial and other days we feel we are losing it. But the trial is over. We are out of the courtroom. It is gone. It is over. Because the ultimate verdict is in.

Do you realize that it is only in the gospel of Jesus Christ that you get the verdict before the performance? The atheist might say that they get their self-image from being a good person. They are a good person and they hope that eventually they will get a verdict that confirms that they are a good person. Performance leads to the verdict. For the Buddhist too, performance leads to the verdict. If you are a Muslim, performance leads to the verdict. All this means that every day, you are in the courtroom, every day you are on trial. In Christianity, the verdict leads to performance.

You see, the verdict is in. And now I perform on the basis of the verdict. Because He loves me and He accepts me, I do not have to do things just to build up my resume. I do not have to do things to make me look good. I can do things for the joy of doing them. I can help people to help people – not so I can feel better about myself, not so I can fill up the emptiness." (Paraphrased from Tim Keller).

I pray that we are not too busy to see the opportunities God puts in front of us to be a blessing in others lives. I pray that you think about your gifts – not your inadequacies. Do not think 'I am not creative', 'I am not well versed in the Bible', 'I am not _____'. Pray to the Holy Spirit to help you, to help you use your unique gifts to pour into a Bible for someone else. I pray that through this project, we experience a time of stillness and we are refreshed. I pray it rejuvenates our time in the Word and draws us into knowing our Lord and lets us recognize His voice more clearly. I pray we spend time talking to Him, journaling, and writing down our thoughts. And I pray that we learn who we are because God loves us and because He loves us so much that He sent His one and only son to stand trial for us. The verdict is over. Jesus Christ went to trial for us. He died and rose again. He is alive and in Him we are free.

You are His child, you are no longer condemned, you have purpose and you are free. Thank you for joining me in the journey as we are transformed by His Word and learn who we are when our identity is in Christ.

Day 4: I am delivered

Colossians 1:13-14 He has delivered us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

More than any one concern that I see, hear, and feel, is that we are not enough. We don't believe we are enough for our friends, our spouses, our co-workers, our parents, or our kids. Shame and guilt for all we have done, should have done, but didn't, and what has been done to us rages inside our hearts and our minds. Catchy sayings, inspirational books, and even well meaning Christians (like me), aim to ease us of the discomfort of being not enough. Stacks of trophies, awards, and plaques remind us of all the "good" things we have accomplished. We work terribly hard at proving to anyone and everyone that we are enough, and yet, it is never good enough, high enough, or true enough.

And the truth of the matter is – it will never be enough. It can't be, you can't be. This is not a popular sentiment, but it is true, you are not enough. I am not enough. We are not enough. God has known that from the very beginning, and He and Jesus decided that we were still worth creating. Follow the story of creation, to where man and woman sin for the first time, to the set up of a system of sacrifices, and you will see that every single person who attempted to live up to God's expectations, failed. Every. Single. One. No matter what the circumstances, in their own power they were not enough.

As men and women continue to try and make themselves right with God by living well enough, sacrificing enough, and being enough, they continue to fail. From the beginning of our lives, we have failed. And no matter how desperately we seek to be good, do good, and be enough, we continue to fail. So while we may be able to convince ourselves for a little while with a catchy phrase or the encouragement of a friend, we ultimately never believe we are enough – because we aren't. Until we can accept that we are not enough, we can never understand our need for Jesus. We might decide that we believe we have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God and therefore accept Jesus as our Savior, but we will continue to try to be enough until we accept that it is never going to happen.

I struggled with this part for years and years and years. I wanted to love Jesus – but be enough on my own. I wanted to be good, and wanted, and valued, and enough. Finally, it hit me that everything I was trying to achieve on my own, had already been accomplished. By Jesus, the only being capable of making me good, and wanted, and valued, and enough. And the very idea that He would come and die for me on a cross, meant that I was loved beyond measure. It's a hard thing to decide that you are never going to measure up. You are never going to be enough. But when you do, when you realize you are fighting a losing battle, you can surrender it all to Him and you are free. He is enough in our stead. And He makes us enough. "But God demonstrates His own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." Romans 5:8

The only decision we ever have to make to be enough is to believe that we aren't – but He is. Jesus is the Son of God who came down from Heaven as a baby, lived a perfect life, and then died on a cross to pay for our sins. When He arose from the grave, we had the option of believing in Him and knowing with a peace that passes all understanding that we can join Him in Heaven if we believe in Him. Our only chance at being enough – is being in Him.

This is one of those verses whose impact cannot be overstated. We have gone from doomed to delivered, from darkness to light, from a sinner who deserves death, to a beloved Child of God, and from a slave, bound by our sins, into freedom.

Day 5: I am not helpless

Philippians 4:13 I can do all things through him who strengthens me.

I like to call today's verse – a t-shirt verse. We see verses like this on display everywhere, offering encouragement and inspiration – "I can do all things!"

But it is not about ME doing all things. It's about Christ, who died for us, so that through him, we can do all things because He is our strength.

We are in final chapter of a letter written by Paul (a church planter) and he is writing to the people in Philippi. The book of Philippians is about the maturing believer – after we have surrendered to the Lord, what does life look like? How do we know Him and walk more passionately with Him.

When I narrow in on a verse like this, at the very least you must understand the context of the surrounding verses, and eventually the entire book and how it fits into God's Story (which is the Bible). Read through Acts 16 (where the church started) and come here to where Paul is addressing those believers with serious love and affection. Before we get to our key verse, Paul says "I have learned"

What did Paul learn?

He learned in all situations to be content. He learned that our circumstances do not matter or define us. He had to learn this – it does not come naturally. But if you learn more about Paul – you will see he learned this. He learned it by living it.

It does not matter. That is what Paul is trying to tell the readers. When he was living in a house of abundance, he learned to live for Christ in wealth. How to I apply this lesson? Use your wealth to push the kingdom forward, glorify Christ and serve Him completely. Do not hold tightly to it or make it your God.

But Paul also lived imprisoned and he did not give into despair. He rejoiced and was praying and singing hymns to God while by tortured. Rejoice in suffering.

Whether you are wealthy or poor, healthy or sick, whether the world loves you or hates you, Paul is telling us to learn to be content in everything.

Life is lived FOR Him, TO Him, WITH Him, All About HIM. HE is STRONG enough, LOVELY enough, SUSTAINING enough, BIG enough, and BEAUTIFUL enough. HE is Enough and when He is in us, then we are enough.

So it's not about me. It not about me doing all things. It's about Christ, who died for us, so that through him, we can do all things because He is our strength.

Day 6: I have access to the Father

Ephesians 2:18 For through Him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father

Read Ephesians 2:13 and 2:18. "You have been brought near to Him (2:13). This helped make a connection for why this verse shows our Identity in Christ.

Not only do I have access to the King of Kings, I have been brought near to Him. His people, and the Gentiles, we're both reconciled to Him through Christ's death. Praise God!! But now, not only do I get to go to Heaven too – but I have been granted access to His throne room. I am brought near to the lover of my soul. I am brought near to my Good, Good, Father. Not only do I have access to Him as a guide, and a granter of wisdom, I have been brought near to the one who loves me most. Because of what Christ did, and through the power of the Holy Spirit, I do not worship some far away being. I get to come close, lie at His feet, soak in His presence, and be intimately loved by Him.

That thrills my heart. I can go to Him at any time. I don't have to ask permission and hope He will make time to see me. I am near to Him all the time.

Coffee Break: Wrestling

Did you think Day 6 was a little confusing?

I really wrestled with it. Definition of wrestle: to work hard to do something difficult. The verse was confusing for me and I had trouble connecting it to "Who am I"?

There are going to be days like this for you. But it's days like this where God shows me the wonders of His Word. When I have to dig into His Word for myself. When there are no commentaries or stories readily available, just me, Him and His Word.

Start off by pray. Pray that the Holy Spirit help me. I prayed to not approach this as another things on my to-do list and to prayed to Him to help me understand who He is and who I am in Him.

As Kelli Moore from All Your Heart Ministires said, "Sometimes we have to wrestle with Scripture. Sometimes it isn't easy and God doesn't reveal anything of dire importance at the first reading. Sometimes, He wants us to think it through, ask the questions, and use our resources. The more time it takes to figure out what God means for you to understand about Him, the longer you are spending time with Him and the deeper the verse will be etched into your being. And He always, always, wants us to pray and ask the Holy Spirit to speak to us.

We believe that spending daily time in His word and learning to understand it, is crucial to your relationship with Him. Day 6 was a great illustration of that fact. I wrestled and fought and prayed and now I have a verse that is precious to me, rather than a verse that was "just in there." Now I have that reminder from God that He is always with me, that He wants me to know it. Now, I have a blessing."

Day 7: I have peace

Ephesians 2:14 For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility

It was Christmas Eve and there were probably hundreds of people around but I don't remember anyone else. I was kneeling. The room was dimmed, but there was light coming in from the outside. Maybe the moon reflecting off of snow. I don't know. I was at a church. I was at an altar. I was crying and begging for God to take away the constant buzzing in my head. It had been there for years and I couldn't make it go away.

I was so tired of it. Just tired period. Lost, directionless, burdened. Walking around like I had a weighted hoodie over my head and body.

I didn't know what was wrong with me. I do now.

I didn't know why my brain was constant chaos and confusion. My thoughts were always telling me "something's wrong" all day long, it was always playing like background music. I woke up sad and went to bed sad and in between I was overwhelmed, exhausted, short fused, and always searching. All the time.

I had three little children to take care of. I took care of them better than I took care of myself but it took everything in me and I had a very limited supply of patience or understanding, while my brain was buzzing and humming and making noise all day. While I was weighed down. While my thoughts would never stop telling me: Something. Is. Wrong.

I was sure I was the only person in the world with a brain like that.

Why couldn't I stop it.

I'm one of the most strong-willed people I've ever met but this "thing" was stronger than my will. I could out-think bulimia and make the Dean's List every semester and face my fear of flying and learn how to drive a stick shift. But I couldn't stop this "thing" in my brain. This thing told me that I could make myself do plenty of stuff - like the aforementioned list - but there was NO WAY I could share the powerful, passionate, pressing dreams and goals I had inside. Or make sense of myself, the world, and other people.

NO way.

I could barely make it through the day let alone do any of that.

So I drove with the humming in my head and I went on vacation at the beach which is my favorite place on earth with the humming in my head and posed and smiled for family portraits with the humming in my head. I tried to focus on my children sounding out words and reading me books with the humming in my head. I tried to relax and have coffee with girlfriends with the humming in my head.

I never told a single person about it.

Some of the people who knew me during that time might be reading this now and thinking "well that explains a lot..."

I grew up going to church and always felt close to God but had drifted away in my 20's. I was about

39 when I knelt down at that altar.

One day in my mid 30's, after the jumble of confusion inside my head had been whirling around for several years, it hit me: God was what I needed. It was like that "I should've had a V-8" commercial where they knock themselves in the forehead when they realize they didn't do the most logical and obviously best thing ever.

I knew about God, so why in fact it hadn't occurred to me that He was what I should've been centering myself in, I have no idea. Well actually I do - partially because I thought God was about "being good" and I was already "good," and partially because of something Christians call "spiritual warfare." But I suddenly saw that God was the unifying, certain, sense-making source for my constantly swirling brain. For my life in a world that pretty much made zero sense.

I realized that some people who called themselves Christians seemed to understand things that I just didn't get, and that THAT was where the answer to my internal tempest would be found. I started going back to church but that humming and buzzing and confusion were always there. After a few years I started going to Bible studies and hearing some Christians say similar concepts and words. The ones who said those words seemed to be the ones with the clarity, peace, and lightness in their faces that I so didn't have but wanted. After awhile I could start repeating some of the words and concepts but I really didn't know what they meant.

A lot of times when people would talk about the Bible or quote scripture, it was like they were an a.m. radio station that was mostly static with a few clear words coming through every now and then. It was like something made their words sound like a foreign language to me so I'd zone out a lot.

Then there was that Christmas Eve. I remember going to our car after the church service when I begged God to take the buzzing away and I realized the buzzing was gone.

I remember where our car - a navy blue Honda Odyssey - was parked and what I was wearing - a navy blue skirt and navy blue coat. (Apparently I like navy blue, but I digress...) I tried not to think too much about the buzzing being gone, or to listen for it, because I knew it would come back if I did. But it's 13 years later and it's still gone.

Little by little, with a quieter head, I started to be able to think clearer. I could "hear" scripture and focus on Bible studies.

A little bit of actual JOY and HOPE and LIGHTNESS and ENERGY started entering in my bones... But I

still knew that every time people talked about these certain things --

GRACE

SALVATION

MERCY

JUSTIFICATION

SEPARATION even

SIN

-- they were still foreign language words. I didn't get it. It always felt like I would hit a ceiling when people started talking about this stuff. I could tell they were already above that ceiling.

Then one day... I read this: **"Sin is a fundamental relationship— it is not wrong doing, but wrong being— it is deliberate and determined independence from God.... Other faiths deal with sins— the Bible alone deals with sin. The first thing Jesus Christ confronted in people was the heredity of sin.."** (My Utmost for His Highest, Oswald Chambers).

And that was it.

I finally understood.

I had been in wrong being. Separated from God. Flailing about. Confused. It didn't help me to do just "good stuff" as much as possible because my entire person was still separate from God. It wasn't about which religion had the right set of rules to follow. If those rules didn't re-connect me with the God who made me and everything else here, things were still not going to make sense inside and outside of me.

I cried and claimed Jesus' sacrifice for me and my heredity of sin.

Everything has changed since then. Inside and outside. From my mental & physical health to my relationships to how I spend my time (i.e. not watching the world pass me by anymore).

Not immediately, but steadily.

Because I'm still human I'll be imperfect and messing up the rest of my life, but because of Jesus Christ and the gift of the Holy Spirit in my salvation, I can constantly be made newer and stronger and wiser.

He has given me peace. I am whole. Because I'm reconnected to the part of me that was missing: God.

**"He came and preached peace to you who were far off and to those who were near."
(Ephesians 2:14)**

I have terrifying moments and incredibly stressful days. But inside at my core being - I have peace.

How about you? Are you joined with the God who made you?

**The Bible talks about peace in all areas of life - peace with God, with ourselves, with other people, and in our circumstances - in which area(s) do you have the most and least peace?
How can you let Christ's peace rule there?**

Prayer has often ignited revival. Spiritual awakenings have exploded out of prayer meetings where even a few people have dedicated themselves to pray for their families, communities, and nation. It has happened before. It can happen again.

So, I urge everyone to pray.

Pray for the families of the victims and the perpetrators. Pray for

our communities and cities, that tensions will cease.

Pray for the people we think are at fault and the ones we know are at fault.

Pray for direction - that God would specifically guide you into action.

Pray for wisdom for those who make decisions and laws.

Pray for the safety of law enforcement officers and the eradication of the lawlessness they are commissioned to fight.

Pray that we all will be keenly aware of our thoughts and reactions and will be bold enough to apologize when we should.

Pray for the courage to stand up against racism wherever it's found - and especially when it is expressed by friends and family.

Pray for courage to call wrong wrong and right right.

Pray for God's healing hand on America"

Day 9: I am no longer condemned

Romans 8:1-2 says "There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life has set you free in Christ Jesus from the law of sin and death."

You are loved. You are enough. You are free.

Therefore – As believers, we are set free from the law because Jesus shed his blood on the cross to cover all our sins. We are released from the law and free from whatever held us captive (Romans 7:6). In Christ we are made new, and the standards of the world no longer define us.

Now – Today. Tomorrow. Next year. God is here with us. He sent the Holy Spirit to be our helper (John 14:26) and He will be with us until the end of the world (Matthew 28:20). God is with you always – in your moments of redemption. In your moments of sin. In the deepest valleys and the highest mountain tops, He is with you. And he loves you. He accepts you. He wants you.

No Condemnation – Condemnation is a statement or expression of very strong and definite criticism or disapproval. There is **none** of this for Gods people.

Free – Not physically held by something. Not held by death. Not held by sin. Not held by shame. There is therefore no condemnation. Can we just let that sink in for a minute, friends? Because God sent his only son to die on a cross for **you** and for me, we are free from the law. We are no longer bound by sin and death. We are set free right now, at this very moment.

- Free from feeling inadequate
- Free from our past mistakes
- Free from the mistakes of others that affect us
- Free from the lies of satan that tell us we are not enough
- Free from the pressure to be anything that we are not
- Free from expectations
- Free from overwhelming fear.
- Free from sin.
- Free from shame.

Your mistakes do not define you – **Jesus** defines you. As a believer in the one true God, nothing you do can separate you from the freedom that comes in Christ. Nothing you do can separate you from the love, mercy, grace, and redemption of Christ.

You are overwhelmingly loved.
In Christ you are enough.
And through Him you are set free.

Day 10: I am forgiven

Colossians 1:14 In whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

A few months back, my husband and I received an anonymous card in the mail. It was mailed to the both of us and read something like this, "to one of the nicest, most thoughtful families I know. Thank you for all that you do". I can't remember the exact words, but you understand. Enclosed with the thoughtful, handwritten card was a very generous gift card to a nice, family restaurant in a nearby town. We were blown away at this person's kindness, and humbled, too.

A couple of weeks later, my oldest teenage son got into some trouble at school. Immediately, I began to punish myself for his horseplay behavior that resulted in a suspension from school. Instantly, I felt eyes glaring at me and judging ME for HIS actions. And just like that, I beat myself up emotionally. I wondered if what my son had done would get back to the nice people that sent such a thoughtful card and gift just a couple weeks before. I wished I knew who had sent it, so that I could return it. I hung my head in shame. If they only knew what kind of rotten, filthy parent I was, they wouldn't have sent that.

I had extended full forgiveness and pardon to my son, but not to myself. His sin, I remembered no more. Instead, I took it full on, on my own shoulders. It was a tough burden to carry.

Read the same Colossians verse in the Message version of the Bible and add verse 13 in as well. "God rescued us from dead-end alleys and dark dungeons. He's set us up in the Kingdom of the Son he loves so much, the Son who got us out of the pit we were in, got rid of the sins we were doomed to keep repeating."

Jesus didn't die on that Cross at Calvary for us to walk around beating ourselves up for what He came to set us free from. As humans, we get caught up (with Satan's help, no doubt) in punishing ourselves and we put ourselves in our own prisons of shame and guilt. Just as a mother runs in to rescue her child from the flames, Jesus died on the Cross and rescued us from ourselves, and from this fallen world.

The word redemption means "the action of saving or being saved from sin, error, or evil". Christ redeemed us by His own death and resurrection. Just as I couldn't return the thoughtful note and gift card, we can't return His great love for us when we feel guilty. Just as I did nothing on my own merit to deserve my anonymous thanks, we can't do anything to earn His love for us. His love is perfect, and when we truly accept the gift, we live in freedom. And living in freedom, is exactly what He wants you to do.

It is easy for me to shout God's praises when life is going my way. But in all honesty, in my most difficult trials (and there have been many), my response has often been "Why God?!" And yet, once again, I am reminded that even knowing my normal response to trials, God STILL wanted more for me.

This grace-gift that I have been given, it's undeserved. I haven't yet and won't ever be able to be good enough to earn God's grace.

But God, knowing I couldn't do it myself, sent One in my place.

His grace is abundant and rich in mercy and it is available for each of us.

It is exhausting and impossible and not what God wants for us.

I mean...I am just giving them time to think about what they have done! Or, they do not even know what they did, so since they cannot see what they have done, I cannot bring myself to forgive them yet.

Somebody? Anybody?

BUT, God couldn't stand to not forgive us. He sent His ONLY SON to die for our sins.

The Message bible says: **Instead, immense in mercy and with an incredible love, he embraced us. He took our sin-dead lives and made us alive in Christ. He did all this on his own, with no help from us! Then he picked us up and set us down in highest heaven in company with Jesus, our Messiah." (Ephesians 2:4-6)**

And, after the amazing gift God gave us for sending His Son to die on a cross so we could have our sins forgiven, He doesn't stop there. He goes farther to take us from where we are and place us in "highest heaven" right alongside Jesus.

The Messiah. Who knew no sin.

He puts us in the same category as Jesus. He calls us sons and daughters.

Have you ever been at a point in your life where you thought, "That's it. I've messed it up bad this time. There's no fixing this."?

I have. And, that is where God wants to meet us.

Our broken pieces were never meant to be left where they fell.

He wants to take us and our broken pieces. But, He doesn't want to throw away those pieces. He wants to paint each piece into something beautiful and put them back together piece by piece until the puzzle it creates become a reflection of Him and His Kingdom."

Day 14: I am His disciple

John 13:15 I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you.

The identity statements in the devotional thus far are primarily encouragers...I am fearfully and wonderfully made, justified, not alone, rescued, not helpless, access to the Father, peace, light, no longer condemned, forgiven, with purpose, strong, alive. This one is too. We are His followers and students. But it also carries weight and responsibility and response. I am His disciple.

And Jesus shows us how... I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you (John 13:15)

In the book of John up until this point Jesus has done the extraordinary. To name a few... He is

described as with God from the beginning...God in the flesh entering the world.

He turns water into wine.

He teaches to the reaction of amazement and wonder.

He heals all forms of diseases.

He feeds thousands from practically nothing.

He calms the sea.

He raises the dead.

Now that's an example I can get behind! My two kids have type 1 diabetes and my sweet nephew has cerebral palsy. I often dream of having the touch of healing. If I'm honest though, I couldn't handle it. I would be full of pride and prone to think I was a great healer, not allowing God to do His perfect work in me and others.

But this isn't the examples He is speaking of. On his last night with the disciples, He demonstrates the example of how they should live by getting up from the table, wrapping a towel around His waist, and one by one washing the dirty, dusty feet of His disciples. Even the feet of Judas who John tells us the devil had already prompted to betray Jesus.

Washing the feet of those He is leading. The job of the lowest servant. A job none of them got up to do and one that I would certainly not be first in line to sign up for.

Out of everything He has done, why washing feet as an example? For one, it is something we can all do. But it is more than that.

Serving & Leading in Humility. It's that big of a deal.

In Jesus' powerful acts and miracles among adoring crowds, Jesus showed humility. In

dying for our sins, Jesus showed humility.

In the act of washing His students' feet, Jesus shows humility. In

the extraordinary and in the ordinary, God is glorified.

How do we do this? We know we can't be humble just by telling ourselves to be humble, or even by grudgingly doing "menial" tasks. Leading up to this verse I think we find the key to His ability to serve in all ways with humility.

Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God; so... [he washes his disciples' feet]. John 13:3

The key is to do whatever task is before us – big or small in the eyes of the world – knowing whose we are. It is an inside out thing. It overflows from our heart. A desire to glorify God and not ourselves. Genuinely considering others more important than ourselves. And it takes practice for us who are prone to sin.

Our initial inclination might be to assume that only those in high positions of power, leading big ministries, followed by adoring crowds, securing big contracts, working in prominent places have to check their humility. Certainly pride, self-sufficiency, self-satisfaction, ambition have a tendency to creep in and push God out in these circumstances.

If I had healing power, I would start to think I shouldn't be spending my time doing things like feet washing, having the extra cup of coffee with a grieving friend, picking up the trash after church, making a meal for my neighbor whose husband is deployed. No, I would think I needed to be out healing and using this special gift God gave me. But Jesus is showing us it isn't either/or.

And Jesus certainly understood that these men at the table with Him were going to be the leaders of this new movement. They will be in places and positions of honor. He wants them to see humility as the example of how to be a leader when their time comes.

But the need for humility is equally important when we are doing the feet washing rather than the leading. Instead of glorifying God when we are in a season of doing a lot of the ordinary "dirty" work, we sometimes do it with a grumbling heart, with self-pity, with a feeling that it below us and just not fair that we are stuck doing these things. That is not an example of humility. It is another form of pride.

We aren't humble because we are doing "humble" work. Humility comes from our heart and desire to glorify God – wherever He places us – and not ourselves. We serve to genuinely love our neighbors and put others before ourselves, because Jesus put us before Himself when he suffered to bear our sins. The greatest example of humility and service in history. We humbly serve in the big and small because we love God and we want people to see Him in us and love Him too.

We can only do it, not by looking down at the feet we are washing, but by looking up at the one who loves us and is the giver of EVERY good and perfect gift. The one whose plans and purposes are beyond our wildest imaginations.

With our eyes focused upward, we can say I am His disciple. One who has come to serve and not be served. One who glorifies God and not myself. Let us strive to be joyful foot washers in all things. So joyful that others want to follow our example of following Jesus' example and get up from the table, grab a towel, and wash feet with us.

Day 16: I can understand what God's will is

Ephesians 5:17 Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the Lord's will is.

A pastor spoke one time about how many times we hear "I just wish I knew God's will for my life" and how he personally longed for this. But he later realized it was a misguided way of thinking. Instead, he suggested we focus on our response to the Holy Spirit's leading today, in this very moment, and it will impact the decision we make in the future.

These 4 keys below have been my guiding posts as I make decisions. For major decisions in my life, where I feel the presence of the Holy Spirit giving direction, I journal. I write down the 'problem' or decision, my prayers, the ideas and thoughts during my time with Him, and the future outcome. You'll be surprised how just experiencing this clarity one time will change your life in the way you approach decisions. There have been specific times where I have felt urgings from God's spirit to act in ways I feared the plan, I feared the outcome as I received it.

But God's outcome was far beyond what I could have planned myself and has taught me to trust His plan.

- Walk with God by developing a relationship with Him (not a 'religion or inserting in God when you want). You grow to KNOW Him by spending time in the Word, prayer and Bible Study.
- SURRENDER your will to God: Commit to do whatever it is He desires for you to do. (I also consider counsel from fellow believers and godly mentors that spend consistent time in the Word and in prayer. I also see the patterns of persons providing worldly vs godly advice).
- Gifts: Pay attention to how God has wired you. God has gifted everyone of us to perform a special mission for which we alone were chosen
- LISTEN: Listen to what God might have to say. Ask "What is the next step in _____?" God's will often floods my heart with ideas and information on those questions. This has personally be truly life changing and brought clarity.

Day 17: I am healed from sin

1 Peter 2:24 He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed.

The cross... it reveals God's love and His perfect justice, all in one.

Anytime scripture brings me to mediate on the meaning of the cross, I get overwhelmed and my heart physically feels a heaviness of a mix of grief and gratitude to the One who bore so much on my behalf.

I feel like there has been so much happening around me, in my life and family, in my community, in our nation, and in our world. Amidst the joys, there have been prayers for depression, anger, anxiety, forgiveness, purpose, illness, tragedy, death, suffering, and fear. I am comforted mediating on the cross, where all the wounds of sin are healed and there is peace bought by Jesus' substitution on the cross. But for those who do not believe this, that cannot find peace, the reality literally brings me to my knees.

Sometimes we highlight the person of Jesus as the example (back up to verse 21), but the power comes when we acknowledge the atonement, the bearing of our sins. When we diminish the work of Jesus on the cross, we magnify our human ability to do good and earn our forgiveness. Let us know our identity in Christ by His suffering and find our return to our Shepherd by the power and justice served by 'his body on the tree.'

Our healing returns us into fellowship with God, the chasm that divides us and God, has been overcome. God loves those who are hurting, those who are under the penalty and power of sin. Be delivered and healed from sin. He took our sins. He bore their guilt. He bore their condemnation. And turn to God, return to Him and experience a new enjoyment of peace with Him.

In the summer of 1995, I sat in my car and cried out to God, "If you are really there God, rescue me. Get me out of my mess!"

And He did exactly that – He rescued me from the consequences of the sins others had committed and the sins I had committed. He sent me to work at a place that was completely new to me and far away from the mess I had created. He began to show me through His word, who I was in Him, who He was, and what promises I could claim. He taught me that shame no longer had a place in my life because Jesus had washed my sins away with His blood.

He has worked in my heart from that moment on, He has not stopped. He continues to show me how Jesus' sacrifice has won me the victory. I have struggled through the years with anger, bitterness, sadness, and resentment. I have had to work through these feelings and fight to remember that Jesus wins. Each and every time I have worked through another hard layer of healing, He has been there. I have felt His presence, His love, and His power. I claim this verse as a promise. I am victorious because He was victorious and that will never, ever change.

His offer of victory is open to anyone who believes in Him. And though there are still times of hurting, of hardship, and of deep pain, His victory is eternal, and nothing can ever destroy that. The wicked one can not touch you (5:18)

This project was just a project for me - I saw it as a personal stress reliever and way to serve the homeless as a 'triple booked calendar' hot mess of a mom with 5 littles under 10 years old. I was not adequately covered in prayer and I was left open for attacks by the enemy. I was feeling my family attacked, my passions, my time, my energy - one by one and there were many times I just wanted to stop.

But God used this trial for my good. I learned I could not do this alone, I needed Him and others and then I prayed and they prayed for me. Every day, I committed to prayer and I committed to being into the Word. I felt God's direction and heard His voice.... but I was still overwhelmed. I thought - "God, I am doing as you say, I am in your Word, I am praying. I acknowledge the good, I see your plan, I get it now. Why are the attacks still happening and I do not have the energy. Where is the strength and the rest for the weary you promised??"

Then my 2 year old daughter had an almost tragic accident and I had this overwhelming feeling that she was going to be taken from me. The images are seared in my mind of her dropping out of consciousness and visions consumed my mind of her not waking up. But then I said to God "Thy will be done." And my thoughts were flooded with scripture from the previous weeks. He literally pulled me out of a mind storm of anxiety and defeat, with His very Word that I read just weeks before.

I didn't know I needed those Words so badly. And at the moment I read them, it felt like a to do. I knew I needed to do it, but more as a task, a challenge. But now... after seeing how He provided His Word to literally save me from the attacks to my mind, I cannot imagine not arming myself every single day.

There are days I feel so busy, so tired, and prayer and reading God's Word will simply not wash the pile of dishes in my sink.

My 2 year old frustrates me and I forget that day. The power of remembering... can I beg you - don't wait. You just do not know what is going to happen tonight. Tomorrow, next week. It literally pains me to think that you might go through a potentially tragic incident with a loved one and not be prepared. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you, to help you constantly fill your mind with His Word and lift your prayers to Him. And as difficult as it seems to make time or to learn how, God didn't leave us defenseless. Don't let these powerful weapons collect dust.

Day 23: I can give thanks for everything

Ephesians 5:20 ...giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ

Let's do a pull-back and put this verse in context:

"Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, making the best use of the time, because the days are evil. Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery, but be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with your heart, giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, submitting to one another out of reverence for Christ." (Eph.15-20)

We can now see that this verse is stuck towards the end of a something that looks like a list. At the beginning of this list, I see the word "therefore." I've learned that whenever you spot the word "therefore" in the Bible, you need to look before it to see what it's "there for." When we do that, we see God telling us to be careful how we live. To not live as those who are unwise.

To make the best use of our time, because time is short. I think that's how a lot of us crave to live. We don't want to waste our lives. We want to be sure we're using our time for the right things. We don't want to waste this. But we're scared because we don't know exactly how. That's why it's so helpful that we're provided with these instructions. I'll let you read through that whole passage and glean from it, but for now I'm going to zoom in on verse 20, where it talks about giving thanks.

Giving thanks. Do you think that's an odd thing to be on a list about how to be wise and not waste your time? At first it may seem that way, but really, thankfulness is to our soul like oxygen to our lungs. It keeps us spiritually healthy and alive! Sometimes we get caught up in what we're doing for God that we forget to give thanks to Him. Or we view it as lesser than serving Him in another way. But be sure of this, God commands thankfulness, He delights in thankfulness, and He is glorified in thankfulness. Thankfulness in the hard things; in the happy things. In the mundane things. In the exciting things. In the scary things. All the time. For everything. This can be done as simply as stopping and saying a quick prayer of thanks for a specific thing or way you saw God work. It can be singing a song of thanks, or creating any piece of artwork for that matter. Mostly, it's a posture of our hearts.

So today I urge you to remember--You want to make the most of your time? Take time for thankfulness unto the Lord!!!

2 Timothy 1:7 For the Spirit God gave us does not make us timid, but gives us power, love and self-discipline.

God gives me the perseverance to see through to the end the tasks He has given me.

In the end, the only real question is this: From where do we get our identity? Do we subscribe to the flawed vision that we get from ourselves? Or, do we read today's verse and trust that God will do what He says He will do? If we are to truly call ourselves followers of Christ, we have to trust that God will make perfect His strength in our weakness (2 Cor. 12:9), that His word does not return to Him useless (Isaiah 55:11) and that there is power in the Gospel message (Romans 1:16). Fundamentally, all of my questions are questions of Trust. And, when I trust in God, He answers the questions.

Romans 8:28 And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose

Read that verse through a few times and then ask yourself a really hard question: "Do I really believe that God is at work for my good?"

Sometimes when we find ourselves in a really difficult situation we may begin to question, to doubt, to ask: "Do I really trust God?"

In this world we will have trouble. But in Jesus we have peace. So we must stick close to Jesus.

I'd like to invite you to spend some time in one of my favorite chapters of the Bible, John 15. Read the words of Jesus where He says:

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener." (v1)

"I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." (v5)

"As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Now remain in my love." (v9)

A joy that is not only sweet, but is completely fulfilling and sustaining. A joy so complete the "happily ever after" of Disney princesses pales in comparison.

A joy in which we can know and trust that through His great love for us, God is indeed working all things together for our good.

I toss up duplicate as God's plan - an emphasis for us to really fix our mind on what it means to be a child of the one, true King. Thank you to Amanda Hertzler for today's devotional.

"Adoption brings beauty to an ugly reality. You would probably quickly agree that the concept of adoption is wonderful, but think of why it is needed. A child is adopted because they were orphaned. Their parents, family, and identity were taken from them. They do not know stability. They are not told of their worth. They are alone. However, through the selflessness of another, these missing pieces can be restored.

We cannot earn the right to be adopted into God's family. We cannot fight for it, debate for it, or work for it. We can only accept it. We can choose to exchange the reality of loss and loneliness for one of love and acceptance. He GIVES us the right.

Stop living as though you are not worthy of his love. Stop trying to analyze your flaws and weigh your values against your problems. You have already been given the right to be a part of God's family. He offers you his name. He offers you your identity. You are not a lonely, forgotten child. You are a beautiful creation who bears his name. This is a name that is greater than fear. It is stronger than our weakness. It breaks the chains of death and despair. It bears grace and establishes peace.

I have been challenged to live in this freedom. To be honest, I don't fully understand it. I am constantly tripping over my own inadequacies. But God is constantly reminding me that it's okay that I can't conquer my fears alone. I'm not meant to. I am a child of God. I am a part of his family, and I bear his name.

I pray that you come to know this freedom as well. Turn your gaze from the mirror and look to the One who holds it. Listen to who he tells you that you are."

As you read today's verse, take time to read the below reflection from Teresa Idoux. In a world where we have to earn everything, it's hard to understand the gift God gave us by sending His son to die for us.

"Many days I wake up on a familiar path, mostly guided by the way and routine of this world, and I pace and move, then find myself sprinting along, trying to keep up. My heart sighs and weighs in as troubles come. Then as sure as the day sets in, my heart begins to long for a place of understanding and belonging. Growing up, I struggled with this feeling. Losing my father at an early age gave me a skewed idea of my place in this world and I struggled to find it for myself- I looked for my place in my grades, in being "good", my accomplishments, in my faults, my mistakes, my inequities. I tried hard and I worked hard and I paced, and paced, and paced. Until one day, the truth that He had wanted me to hear all along came in one sentence, "He has done it all, you need not do anything but believe."

I think that in order to feel loved and accepted, we believe we need to be able to pull our own weight, do something to earn our place. Our Father does not ask us to perform to be accepted as His. He loved us enough to send His only son to die for us so that we would live as His children, chosen and holy and loved (1 John 3:1). No grade requirements, no weight standards, or tasks to mark off a list. He died for us as we were and keeps us within His loving grasp as we are. He knows us by name, we belong to Him, and we are His (Isaiah 43:1). May we walk in this truth as we strive to belong; may we set performance aside and simply remember that we have a place. May we embrace our identity as children of a Father who has done it all for us."

Day 29: I can grasp how wide and long and high and deep Christ's love is

Ephesians 3:18 ... may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ"

Recently, out of His great love for me, God has begun to show me that I have spent my entire adult life building walls. Walls around my self, to protect and fortify my heart, walls of safety that I felt were a necessity. I have lived so long with these walls in place that they have become a part of me; I could no longer see nor realize they were there. God has unveiled my eyes to see the truth, that these walls are built by bricks of lies, fear and insecurity. He is showing me that the walls built by lies cannot withstand the truth of His love.

In our verse for today, Paul writes that he wants the Ephesians to "**grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ.**"

I thought I did. I thought I had a good, solid grasp on the magnitude of God's great love for me. But while I know the words to be true, and while I believe them with all my heart, I know that I have not been walking freely in the fullness of God's love for me.

God, in His goodness and mercy, is showing me that even were I to spend the remainder of my days building with all my might, I would never be able to construct walls to withstand the power and ferocity of His great love for me.

In Romans 8:35 Paul writes that "**nothing shall separate us from the love of Christ.**" Nothing. He goes on in verses 38-39 to declare: "**neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.**"

Not any thing in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God. Nothing.

Not even walls of self preservation that we may have spent over half our lives constructing.

God's love is so wide. We cannot go around it.

His love is so long. We cannot escape it.

His love is so high we can never build walls high enough to keep His love out.

And His love is so deep that as much as we may try to burrow into our cave of self protection; the deeper we try to hide our selves away, we will always only ever find more of His great love for us.

In Psalm 139 David writes that we are "fearfully and wonderfully made." He also proclaims that there is no where we can go from God's Spirit, no where we can flee from His presence.

8 If I go up to the heavens, you are there;

if I make my bed in the depths, you are there.

9 If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I

settle on the far side of the sea,

10 even there your hand will guide me,

your right hand will hold me fast.

Psalm 139:8-10

God's love for us is so wide, so long, so high, so deep; there is NOTHING that will ever separate us from His great love. We simply cannot escape His love.

God, I thank You that in Your Word You promise to shine the light of your love brightly in my heart, to expose all of my dark places, all of my hurts, and all of my pains, to Your healing love. I thank You that You take my brokenness and You make me whole. I thank you that wherever I may be, from the heavens to the depths, from the wings of the dawn to the far side of the sea, You see me. You know me. And you love me. I can never escape your love.

I pray for my self and for all Your children reading these words that we will live as people free and confident as we walk in Your love for us. Ephesians 2:22 I am a dwelling for the Holy Spirit

God breathed life into Adam and Eve. They weren't merely created, they were given a life giving breath by God. And then they dwelled with God.

Take a minute and imagine what that must have been like- the lush beauty of the garden. The feel of the grass on their bare feet. The sun warming them just right as they walked through the Garden with beams of sunlight peeking through the boughs of the trees- full of fruit- perfectly ripe and ready for the picking.

As the day rolled on, Adam and Eve rest in the shade of a tree. And in the midst of Adam and Eve sitting against the trunk of the tree- God sat with them.

It's not that He was dwelling with them in a blaze of glory that caused them to need to cover their faces as Moses did. It's not that He overwhelmed Adam and Eve- it's that He completed those moments. He brought a wholeness to the creation that He created. The creator dwelling with the created. The male and female He created and used His own breath to breathe life into- just dwelt and all was very good.

It's hard for me to remember that this sense of wholeness and completion is what it means when we dwell with God. The perfect grace and peace that comes with that dwelling is a gift and a taste of what Heaven is like. When the fall happened- it wasn't just the brokenness and sin and evil that ran rampant and created a chasm between us and God- that was bridged with Christ's death and our acceptance of that sacrifice.

Where Satan starts to win with God's people is when he throws the lie that Christ's death doesn't qualify us to DWELL with God today. We have had a blanket thrown over our heads that makes us forget that when God breathed life into us, He breathed part of Himself into us- the Holy Spirit. That is almost ridiculous to think about. The God of the universe not only desires to dwell with us but makes it so easy by creating in us a dwelling place for the Holy Spirit.

We don't have to go any place special to dwell with God. We don't have to call and set up an appointment to meet with God. He has made it so simple, we can't always believe it- He's with us all the time. Immanuel- God with us. Not just when we rub the lamp, but all the time.

Dwelling with God is a gift and part of the intent of God's creation. God desires for us to dwell with Him and be with Him. Did you catch that? Do you believe that- God pursues you to dwell with you. The artist of your soul and of your being desires to be with you.

It's in those times of dwelling with God that we experience His love in ways that are at times so real they are uncomfortable. It's the dwelling times that give us the space to sit and BE who GOD HAS CREATED US TO BE. We allow the artist to continue to create more fully what He has started. He who began a good work in you will continue until the day of completion. When we dwell with God, we are giving permission for the artist to continue the masterpiece.

Day 31: Bonus Devotional

My husband says I'm the least patient person he's ever met.

That might sound like something horrible to hear but I know it's true. The second least patient person is probably my oldest daughter, in whom I see myself every time she drives me somewhere or we talk about certain subjects such as...

... people's behavior in crowds. Or their behavior related to politics. I

get her and we feel each other's pain.

One year for Lent I gave up making angry remarks about other people's driving. When I saw how often I had to stop myself mid-sentence, I realized how much of a bad habit it was for me. I'm really glad this became permanent beyond Lent and I either stop a snarky comment before it continues or I just keep it zipped in the first place.

I have no idea how I got such a minuscule (and even that is a generous description :)) supply of patience in my DNA. My parents have pretty much an unlimited supply. In fact they're probably at the other end of the spectrum - in the most patient people in the world category. I guess they got our whole family's portions because my brother doesn't have a whole ton of patience either. The only sibling with patience is the one not biologically related to us. Oy. Lucky her!

So anyway ever since I started working as the Office Manager / IT Department / Help Desk / Chief of HR / Compliance Supervisor for the family business, I spend a great deal of time needing to contact customer service representatives from many organizations.... our internet provider, companies we contract with, vendors, banks, the mobile & landline phone companies, computer and software companies, copy centers and office supply stores.

I also spend time with some regularity in lines at the post office....

When I first started doing this job I was frustrated within the first millisecond - as in, when I realized I had to pick up the phone and deal with this thing. Or definitely by the time the "menu options" were announced.

But lately I realized, after a delivery truck tore the cable line out of the pole in front of our house and our internet, landline, fax and cable went out during the Verizon strike and therefore weren't restored for three days ... when I called and told the same story more times than I can count for a few days in a row with an extremely calm voice... that dealing with customer service was actually becoming one of my talents.

Was I actually starting to develop PATIENCE???

God works in mysterious ways.

But I also realized something else recently: I've been going at it ALL WRONG. I stumbled on that realization by "accident" when I signed up to be a guest contributor for The Loved Bible Project. The scripture I was supposed to design art work and/or a blog post for is **"Through Him [Jesus] you Gentiles are also being made part of this dwelling where God lives by his Spirit"** (Ephesians 2:22).

The scriptures say that Christians are meant to be unified and work as if they're a single body (Christ's

body) together, each person having crucial roles, to make a positive difference and help lead others to God, the same way that Jesus did during His time on earth. So God should be dwelling in that collective body.

The scriptures also say that each individual Christian's body is a temple of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 6:19). I've always looked at this verse only as a reason to have profound respect and take care of my body the way the Israelites were taught to respect and take care of the Temple.

But I started reading more scriptures about the effect that being a dwelling place for God should have on a person, and there's so much more to it than a little blog post can do justice but basically this is mind-boggling. Before Jesus, people could only rely on their own abilities and sometimes they were given momentary Holy Spirit power. But Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to stay in us.

From personal experience and stories I hear from other Christians, I know that upon salvation we can be miraculously and instantly healed of many things. But we don't become perfect. We're wrapped in human flesh and we're always going to struggle with its weaknesses. The Holy Spirit is what helps us keep healing and keep being more than we could ever be on our own. The same power that created every single thing DWELLS, permanently, in me.

What?? What a gift!!!

Why on earth am I not tapping into that constantly?

Here I am literally having this superpower but I keep trying in my own resolve to have more patience or conquer fears or be nicer. Then I berate myself for not being a "good enough" Christian / person / whatever.

I'm guessing others can relate... especially because this seems to be preached quite a bit: "What's wrong with you? You're a Christian, you're not supposed to struggle with that anymore." "Be more _____." "That's 'bad' so shame on you."

The point isn't to minimize our faults or be defeated by them or beat ourselves up over having them. God is so loving and caring that He actually comes and dwells in us so we have help. "for it is God who works in you to will and act in order to fulfill His good pleasure." (Philippians 2:13).

This isn't supposed to be a secret, but for some reason we're always told to "be more _____" in our own strength instead of going to the God who works in us.

So I've been trying something different this week with my struggles. Instead of summoning my own will to be patient, kind, or have self-control when I don't feel like it, I stop and say to myself "ok Holy Spirit, **I can't do this but You can.**"

It takes a lot of trust in God for me to do this. If I don't trust that His ideas about loving my neighbors and having self-control are actually wiser than my ideas to look at Facebook instead of go help my elderly neighbor or to indulge in something unhealthy my stomach or brain is telling me it wants, then I'm not going to let the Holy Spirit help me.

It reminds me a lot of willpower. We can keep questioning our lack of willpower and vow to summon up more willpower tomorrow, or on Monday, or for our New Year's Resolution. But for some reason it just doesn't seem to stick.

Our "why" makes all the difference in the world.

Why should I let the Holy Spirit be patient for me when not a cell in my being wants to be? Because He knows better and I trust Him and it works.

I want to end by repeating that as long as we're wrapped in human flesh we will struggle. No perfect person exists, even with the Holy Spirit. I'm not saying the Holy Spirit will fix and cure every single problematic human tendency if we let Him. But we can most certainly be people who are becoming more peaceful and content and helpful and caring than we were before being saved or can ever be in our own strength. We should be part of the solution, not part of the problem. We Christians have power within us to ease our own pain and that of others.

As Priscilla Shirer says in the Armor of God study, we have this benefits package and quite an exquisite inheritance at our disposal. We need to stop living below our means.

Here's to continuously opening this amazing gift from our lavishly loving God!

Believe in what He can do for and through you, and let go of the expecting perfection or superpower on your own! It's not about you... you can't but He can.

Jesus said...'If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, **and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free**...truly, truly I say to you, everyone who practices sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not remain in the house forever; the son remains forever. So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed.'

[John 8:31-36, emphasis mine]

As I reflect on the last 31 days, I am so encouraged by the promise made to us in this verse.

What would this generation of women look like if we truly loved and lived like we believe the freedom God promises in John 8:32? We would love more passionately. We would serve without fear. We would share with reckless abandon. We would forgive. We would flood the gates of heaven, praying and petitioning for what God has put on our hearts. We would be faithful in the small instead of feeling inadequate to attempt more. We would run to Christ, chains broken and spirits encouraged.

What do you need to be freed from? Write it down. Stare it in the face. Share it with a trusted friend. And then declare God's word over it. He promises that if we abide in his word and are truly his disciples, freedom will follow. Today, tomorrow, next week, next year. Maybe he frees you through counseling, a friend, a book, prayer, more time in the word, accountability, community, or any combination. God is big. So much bigger than we could ever comprehend. God's word is living and active and his love is steadfast. His promises are all given in faithfulness to his precious children [Psalm 33:4].

Let's start living like we believe that if we know the truth of God's word – if we know who we are in Christ and find our identity in him – **the truth will set us free. And if the Son sets us free, we are free indeed.**

Day 31: Bonus

John 8:32 Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free

We've spent the last 30 day digging into what it means for our identity to be grounded in Christ.

When I think of identity I often think of the lies I've believed in my own life about who I needed to be or what I perceived as others expectations of me. About five years ago God began to chisel away at the words, thoughts and emotions that had plastered themselves around my heart.

Unfortunately many of those had to do with my identity. One of the biggest lies that up to that point had controlled much of my life, even as a follower Christ, was this idea that I needed to have it all together at all times and that there was no room for brokenness. That lie kept me from asking for help, from allowing others to grieve with me over losses in my life, and ultimately from confessing my sins and experiencing God's forgiveness. As God chiseled away at those things binding my heart I realized that all that was left was this broken hot mess and it wasn't as scary as I thought it would be. It took vulnerability, accountability and several teary moments as God took each piece and stitched my life back together into the life He'd created for me.

One of today's verses is John 8:32, "Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." In my life that truth was that at the end of the day it didn't matter if I was married, if I had children, if I had a good job, if I had a college education, if I had a nice home, or if my life looked picture-perfect; it only mattered that I was a child of God. As I've learned to walk in that mindset not only has my perspective on life changed, but I've experienced firsthand the freedom of not living up to others expectations and not allowing the things of my past to be my identity.

In the book of Acts we are introduced to a man name Saul who mercilessly persecutes the followers of Jesus. He has them arrested, thrown into prison and stoned for following Jesus' teachings instead following Jewish law. If you read the story, which you can find in Acts 9, Saul become blind after an encounter with God. God then send's one of His followers Ananias to Saul instructing Ananias to pray that Saul's sight be restored. It is said that something similar to scales fell from Saul eyes and he could immediately see. Saul confessed his faith in God and dedicated the rest of his life to serving Jesus. He also changed his name to Paul, as an outward sign of his inward heart change. God used Paul in incredible ways to further the gospel, to write letters that we read today in the Bible and to be a practical example of God freeing us from the labels we so easily get caught up in.

Paul could have believed that he was not able to be free from his sins and allowed them to dictate his identity. Instead God used him as a practical example of a changed life. The truth that sets us free is the gift of God's grace which is unconditional. It cannot be obtained through good thoughts, good works or words. In our lives we come up against emotions and situations that can become a prison for our souls, our thoughts and our bodies.

When you accept Jesus truth and freedom, it doesn't mean that the temptation you are fighting today will instantly be gone tomorrow. Or that the financial trouble you are currently walking out will disappear. Rather it means that in recognizing the truth of who God has created you to be; His child.

What does that mean practically for our identities?

It means if you're an addict, you wake up each day surrendering to God and asking Him to give you the strength to fight against your addiction.

It means if you're a mom, and you've bought into the lie that "you're only a mom," you ask God to provide you with joy as you run from carpool, to practice to making dinner.

It means if you're an executive whose days are filled with stress and anxiety, that you face the day asking God to give you the grace to not allow the stress and anxiety to control your life.

In Romans 8:2 Paul wrote, "Because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit who gives life has set you free from the law of sin and death" The law of the Spirit is referring to who you are submitting to everyday; Satan with his negative and evil ways or Jesus and His grace and kindness. The law of sin is the bondage we are in from our actions and our thoughts. While the law of the Spirit is the redemption we experience when we accept that Jesus came and paid the price for our sins; offering us unconditional freedom, through His shed blood.

Where is your identity today; is it in being a child of God? If not will you join me in this freedom of accepting God's grace and walking out this life as God's child? It will change your life from the inside out!

Purchase a leather (or like leather) 4×6 Bible. I like to use The New International Version or the English Standard Version. The size is important; often the receiver has to travel light with very few things. We do not want this to be a burden.

LOVE IT.

Highlight verses – encouragement, worry, fear, courage, grace, strength, rest, mercy, love, salvation. Follow along with The Loved Bible Project on Facebook for weekly prayer prompts. Write on sticky notes, cards, sheets of paper. Include prayers, songs, drawings, or add stickers.

I like to put a sticky note in the front of the Bible I am working on. I put a goal... *I will pray and Love this Bible for 10 minutes, 3 times a week for 30 days.* It can be any goal that suits your life right now. Just hold yourself accountable.
